#### • 26 August: Are you wildfire ready?



Rooiels, Pringle Bay and Betty's Bay were selected to be the first fire wise communities in South Africa. Liz Buncker and Jorika Rabie of the Betty's Bay Volunteer Community Fire Fighters provided guidelines and actions that property owners can take to reduce their fire risk. Here are a few of the basics:

We live in a high fire risk area and we need to be prepared! It is good to do an annual fire risk assessment of your property – both inside and outside.

- Is your home easily accessible for emergency vehicles?
- Increased risks outside include combustible material in your gutters,

firewood stacks next to your house and trees that touch or are very close to your house. "Firescape" your garden with smaller plants closer to your house and taller vegetation further away. There is no need to strip the plot of all vegetation to firescape it.

• Remember to dispose of braai coals safely – the wind can pick up and ignite them again.



Inside, do you have fire extinguishers that are serviced regularly and do you know how to use them correctly? Do you have a fire blanket? Are your extension cords of a high quality and safe?

Barbara Jenman, the coordinator of the event in Betty's Bay, arranged clean-ups at Silversands and Main Beach. At Main Beach, sixteen people, mostly members from the Betty's Bay Conservancy, met Wilna Swart in the car park to get a bag supplied by Plastic SA for the clean-up. Residents cleaned up around the ablution block and car park as well as spreading out in both directions on the beach. It was encouraging to see that Main Beach

wasn't covered in loads of litter – a positive result of the many residents who daily walk the beach with a bag and pick up litter as they walk! The content of the bags of litter collected will be analyzed. Thanks to the organisers, coordinators and all those who helped clean the beaches and are part of the "local solution" for this global problem of ocean trash.

## GREAT SOUTHERN BIOBLITZ (GSB): 28 – 31 October 2022

The Overstrand took part in the Great Southern Bioblitz for the second time in 2022 ... with amazing results! We came first in the entire southern hemisphere - thanks to our brilliant biodiversity and the amazing passion of the folk who participated.

The GSB 2022 saw cities and towns throughout the southern hemisphere participating for four days



in October to capture diversity in their areas. People were requested to take photographs of every living thing (other than humans and pets) and to upload these to iNaturalist. For two weeks after the bioblitz people spent time uploading their observations and trying to assist with identifications. Sharing these observations helps create quality data for scientists

working to better understand and protect nature.

Over the four days the 171 observers in the Overstrand recorded 19 808 observations and a total of 2 623 different species – highlighting the magnificent biodiversity of our area. Thanks to everyone who assisted, organised outings, took photos and helped with the identifications.

Huge congratulations also go to: Cape Town - 3rd place Garden Route - 4th place Overberg - 5th place (on their first attempt!).



"This truly is a special part of the world – and the Bioblitz proves that our biodiversity is unique and deserves our continuous protection!" said Sandy Immelman, BBC.

#### • 26 November: Beauty of Butterflies



Andrew Morton (Chair of the Western Cape branch of Lepsoc Africa - Lepidopterists' Society of Africa) delighted everyone with his passionate presentation about butterfly and moth conservation, butterfly life-cycles and the plants and creatures that they need to survive.

Did you know that there are more butterflies on the Table Mountain range than the whole of the Great British isles? Or that the Table Mountain Beauty (Aeropetes tulbaghia) is the only known pollinator of the red Disa Orchid (Disa uniflora)?

#### • 3 December: BBC participated in the Kogelberg Coastal Clean-up

The BBC was one of the participants in the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Kogelberg Festive Coastal Clean-up. It was a good turn out by those who care about our oceans. 21 locals and visitors helped at Silversands beach. Betty's Bay coordinator, Barbara Jenman, thanked those who helped, many of them are regulars who clean up the beaches in this area constantly, and Robert Kyzer for his excellent leadership. A small group met at Main Beach under the wing of WWF's Kopanang and Lilitha, two members of Robert's Kleinmond team. Not much litter was found but they appreciated the watermelon and prizes at the end. CapeNature oversaw the Stony Point clean-up and had a very successful day too. The Marine and Coastal Community Monitors (MCCM) spread out to the different locations cleaning up and taking videos for reporting back. The plastic collected was delivered to CRDC at Blackheath for processing.

# We are excited to launch our "Welcome to the coastal conservancy villages of the Kogelberg Biosphere Reserve" leaflet.



This new leaflet was a joint initiative of some members of the Betty's Bay Conservancy and the Kogelberg Garden Circle. It highlights some of the special features of our unique area, supports the call to clear just the vegetation for the footprint of a house when a new house in being built and encourages creating a fire wise vacant erf without stripping off all the vegetation. It has a very useful list of contact numbers of the conservation organisations in the three villages, links to websites, Facebook pages and resources. It has been distributed via social media and hardcopy and is also being added to the planning applications received at the Building

Control Office in Kleinmond. It can be downloaded from the Biosphere Living section of the BBC website, together with the accompanying leaflet on eight alien invasive species.

- **The Milkwoods:** No further update on the destruction of Milkwood trees on a private property in Marine Drive and on the coastal public property opposite it.
- **Recent Meetings and Issues:** BBC reps attended the public meeting on baboon management in Betty's Bay, the meeting in Kleinmond on the proposed offshore exploration drilling by Total Energies and the meeting regarding the Stony Point penguin colony hosted by CapeNature.
- Input on the Fire Wise Vacant erven policy: We were informed that the Fire Policy was passed by Council. Conservation organizations from the three Villages are very concerned about some of the specifications and the impact it will have on our fynbos. We have joined together to appeal this policy.
- WILD MAGAZINES: If you have missed getting copies of the three WILD magazines form Rooiels, Betty's Bay and Pringle Bay, there are still copies available. The idea is to continue the series with a joint edition.
